During Lent, we are looking at the road that leads to the



cross. We confess that Jesus was uniquely the Son of God. We must not err however in the belief that the cross and the way that leads to the cross only pertains to Jesus. Jesus said that anyone who wishes to follow him must go the

same road of the cross.

The cross has become such a reverenced symbol of the Christian faith, that we have made the cross an end in itself. The cross cannot be understood as an end in itself. It is the way of the cross, a life of choices that lead to the cross. The cross is the price we pay for remaining faithful and staying on the way.

One way to understand the meaning of the cross is to understand what Jesus did while he was on the way. The gospel writers describe Jesus as one who healed the sick and went about doing good. When Jesus was threatened with death, he said he must continue this ministry regardless of the consequences (Luke 13:32). Such a pinistry of healing and doing good would be applauded by the powers if it was directed to people like ourselves. Jesus' ministry, however, was focused on the rejected of society. We can see in our time that the modern martyrs are also those who ministered to societies' rejected ones.

The road to the cross is not a commitment to die, it is a commitment to faithful ministry of healing and doing good. It is, however, acting out of faith rather then that of a dogooder spirit. Even evil societies like do-gooders because it makes up for their sins. Faith is a sense of how it should be under the rule of God. When we act out of faith, the roots of the suffering of the rejected are exposed. In Jesus' ministry, the cleansing of the temple exposed the structured or institutionalized evil. Instead of finding healing in the temple worship, the masses were being victimized. If this had not been true, they could have tried Jesus fairly in their courts. But because it was true, they had to get rid of the one who exposed them.

The Lenten season is a good time for us to search our hearts and renew our commitment to continue on the way of the cross. We of course must remember, for us it does not end on Good Friday. We must continue on this road. We hope all of you have a blessed experience this Easter season and pray that God will give us courage to remain faithful on the road always.

This Lenten season, now coming down the home stretch to Good Friday and Easter, has also provided opportunity for reflection and meditation. Typically reflections produce an image of how it really is. Occasionally one receives a reprieve in being able to project images of the past, through the present and into the future. When that is too frightening an experience to deal with, we can make midcourse corrections and avert disaster. But a much better way is to recognize and respond appropriately to our Heavenly Father's love shown to us in Jesus' life, and now at Easter the meaning and significance of his death for us.

As with gifts that can be accepted or refused, God's Love and Salvation is constantly there, held out to us for our acceptance - the choice is ours. Our Lenten services have been geared in that direction, and it has been very fitting to wind down our study of the book of Mark at this time of year. The book deals with Jesus' life - baptism, temptation, teaching and ministry; Jesus' death - triumphal entry, betrayal, trial and crucifixion; and the bottom line - Jesus' resurrection and his eternal promise.

Spring is the time for living, growing things to revitalize there's lots of evidence out there already and the calendar even confirms this. We also hope to be growing in our spiritual lives, and what better time than in the Lenten season - the spring of our church year - to be revitalized and committed or recommitted. Our Westside neighborhood community is scheduling a "clean-up" day for Saturday, April 22. All who wish to be a part of this activity are invited.


