
Maybe it should not surprise us

He goes on to say that it does not matter so much where you spend your energies, only that you shoulder part of the load.

In 1965, the Western District Conference wanted to establish a Mennonite Church in Oklahoma City. They commissioned Rev. O'Ray and Edith Graber to complete a needs study and search for a church property. By 1996, Oklahoma City had a VS Unit and owned the property at 504 N.E. 16th. Our congregation back then was made up mostly of VS'ers and support committee members. Our greatest mission was "Wonder House", a pre-school in the inner city. We continued this mission until the government duplicated our work with Headstart

life meaning and enrichment. The church in Oklahoma City has had its ups and downs, but generally the message has been the same. To act justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with our God, found in Micah 6:8.

From 1971 to 1979, our church made a bold move. We merged with Trinity Presbyterian Church. It was a wonderful experience: an ecumenical, bi-racial worship environment. One highlight was a social service project where we worked diligently, black and white together. Back then, churches in Oklahoma City were verv segregated. Trinity Mennonite-Presbyterian Church was on the cutting edge, setting a good example for the entire city. During that time, the Grabers moved to St. Louis to work for the National Council for Christians and Jesus. New leadership came to Oklahoma City with Rev. Stan and Marlene Smucker replacing O'Ray and Edith Graber. The split between the Mennonite-Presbyterian congregation in 1979 may have been caused in part by an overextended building program.

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Between 1980 to 1986, the congregation was called the Oklahoma City Fellowship. We met on Sunday evenings with a core of 7 to 8 families to carry on the message. At this time the Smuckers left Oklahoma City to take a church in LaJunta, Colorado.

Around 1987 to 1992, Rev. Mark and Gayle Weins came to Oklahoma City as church planters. This was a time of being the "gypsy" Mennonites, as I think the church moved seven times in one year. Finally, Joy Mennonite Church settled in Mark and Gayle's home.

Joy Mennonite Church has now come full circle and is meeting once again in the livingroom of 504 N.E. 16th, under the leadership of Rev. Moses and Sadie Mast. Spiritually, I believe our church is as healthy as ever. Besides church and Sunday school, we are meeting in "clusters" and prayer groups which I think will help us to act more justly.

Remember, these ideas are only one person's rememberences. The dates are approximate. I love Joy Mennonite Church. I feel ownership to this church. The message continues. Hopefully, it will be as vital 30 years from now and we can learn even better how to walk more humbly with our Lord.

Moses and Sadie...attended the Jesus Lectures at Bethel College this last week.


