Recently the Inter Faith Alliance of Oklahoma City sponsored a seminar on religious extremism. One of the speakers, a Baptist minister, spoke with passion but also a prophetic voice to his people. All the speakers agreed that the world has changed, not on Sept. 11, but with the fall of communism. It seems that religious extremism grew out of the rubble of the communist demise. Religious extremism is not new, what is new is the political power that the extremists suddenly began to exercise, and what might rightfully be called the onslaught of holy wars. Why did this occur after the fall of communism? May it be the need we have to fix blame for that which does not go right and also the need we have to be right while all others are wrong.

We witnessed the aggressive acts of the religious extremists of the Muslim religion and were appalled. It is difficult to see ourselves in the same light. The winds of religious extremism are blowing in our land too. The most obvious comparison is the way we justify killing innocent people to insure the safety and prosperity of our nation. Just as all nations, our nation has done this for economic reasons in the past. Now we have coupled economic interests with religious beliefs. Our lop-sided sense of justice in Palestine, calling one who is remembered for war crimes and has fresh blood on his hands a peacemaker, is a statement of religious conviction, an extreme conviction widely held in our nation.

The question before the community of faith is this, how do we keep from being swept along by these winds of religious extremism. Our Lord told us to be awake, be alert, lest you fall into temptation. We know the temptation to go with the flow. The temptations in our affluent land are subtle and powerful. Jesus further said we must watch and pray lest the cares of this world lead you into temptation. We know that, even living in a land of abundance, the daily tasks of paying bills and putting food on the table can distract us and lead us into temptation. Lastly, we must begin to bind up the wounds of the suffering. Only by entering the world of the wounded can we free ourselves from the idolatrous consumerism for which we must fight wars to protect.
